

Weekly Spelling Challenge:

- 1. Dear Teacher: Write a letter to your teacher using your spelling words. Be sure to use spaces in between your words AND <u>underline</u> your spelling words.
- 2. Rainbow Words: Write each spelling word with a pencil. Then, using different colours, trace the word.
- 3. Apple Words: Draw an apple for each of your spelling words. Write one spelling word inside each apple. Then colour your apples.
- Add It Up: Add the letters in each of your spelling words to find the total. Use the numbers below: (Consonants = 5) and (vowels = 1) Example: Whale Whale = 5 + 5 + 1 + 5 + 1 = 17



- 5. Opposite Hand: Write your spelling words with your opposite hand, the one you usually don't write with.
- 6. Practice Test: Ask an adult at home to quiz you on your spelling words. If you misspell a word, write it correctly three more times.
- 7. Alphabetical Order: Write all your words in alphabetical order.
- 8. Vowel and Consonants: Write the consonants in blue and the vowels in red for each word.


Today select at least <u>one</u> of the possible spelling activities below and complete the task. Please do not repeat an activity. Then have someone give you a practice quiz for tomorrow!

Each day we complete a DLR at school. Some students have emailed me asking for this. Have fun answering the questions and look for all the mistakes. Enjoy!



Social Studies Task


Google Earth

Explore <u>Google Earth</u>. You can zoom in to have a closer look. What countries can you find? When you see a name, click on it. A box will appear giving you more information about that place. Choose one country. Make sure that when you click on it, it says country, and not city or state.




What country did you choose? What continent does your country belong to? I chose **France** and it belongs in **Europe**.

If you don't have a device, or your internet is testing your patience, think about some of the countries that we have already looked at in class. How many can you remember? Make a list. Do you remember what continent they belong to? Do you remember how to say 'hello'. Greet the rest of your family in your new language.



Last week we started talking about repeating addition. Today we are going to continue adding repeating numbers, making repeating pictures and making the connection to multiplication! Look at the example below.



For example: 2 + 2 + 2 + 2 + 2

Here 2 is repeated 5 times, we can write this addition as 5×2 .

Similarly, to solve a multiplication problem through repeated addition, we repetitively group and add the same number again and again to find the answer.

Above are a few examples of repeated addition and multiplication.

Math Continued:

Using the same format as in the above example, answer the following questions.

- 1. 3+3+3=
- 2. 4 x 3 =
- 3. 2+2+2+2+2+2=
- 4. 5 x 5 =
- 5. 6+6+6=
- 6. 2 x 2 =
- 7. 1+1+1+1+1+1=
- 8. 3 x 5 =
- 9. 9+9=
- 10. 3 X 8 =

Good luck! If you your child is struggling, change all the questions to repeated addition and work your way through the example. You can also use different numbers. Whatever works best for your child. If 10 questions are too many, select what you can do. I don't want your child to become frustrated, so work at a good pace for all of you.
